
We Move Together by Kelly Fritsch, Anne McGuire, Eduardo Trejos

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#### Yes I Can! A Girl and Her Wheelchair by Kendra J. Barrett








#### It's OK to Be Different by Sharon Purtill


#### Something to Say Collection by Eden Molineux








#### We're All Wonders by R.J. Palacio




#### Izzy's New Friends by Anna Omalay

# I Can, Too! by Karen Autio and Laura Watson



# You Are Enough by Sofia Sanchez



#### Different: A Great Thing to Be! by Heather Avis



*I Can Do Hard Things* introduces children to the practice of using mindful affirmations for support and encouragement when they need it.






# Evabel by Katie Doering and Krista Perdue
