Origin of Asian Heritage Month

- Senator Vivienne Poy, a renowned fashion designer and entrepreneur, was the first Asian-Canadian appointed to the Senate. <u>Source</u>
- In the Senate, Poy advocated strongly for Asian-Canadian rights and successfully proposed a motion to designate May as Asian Heritage Month, which the government officially recognized in 2002. Source

Did you know....

• In 2021, South Asian (7.1%) and Chinese (4.7%) individuals made up over 10% of Canada's population, while Filipino (2.6%), Southeast Asian (1.1%), West Asian (1.0%), Korean (0.6%), and Japanese (0.3%) individuals accounted for 5.6%. Source
