Did you know?

The celebration of International Women's Day on March 8th is deeply connected to the women's movements during the Russian Revolution in 1917.





 On this day, women in Petrograd (now St. Petersburg) initiated a strike demanding "bread and peace," which sparked a larger movement leading to significant political changes in Russia. This event is one of the key reasons why March 8th was chosen to commemorate women's achievements and advocate for gender equality worldwide.

New Zealand was the first self-governing nation to allow women to vote.

 This historic milestone was achieved on September 19, 1893, when Governor Lord Glasgow signed the Electoral Act into law12. This landmark legislation marked a significant step forward in the global movement for women's suffrage. <u>Source</u>, <u>Source</u>(2)

The colours of International Women's Day—purple, green, and white.

 Purple represents justice, dignity, and loyalty to the cause. Green symbolizes hope, while white stands for purity, though this concept is somewhat controversial. These colours were first adopted by the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) in the United Kingdom in 1908. Source
