- Eid al-Fitr is commemorated with communal prayers held in mosques, followed by joyous gatherings with loved ones.
- Muslims come together to share meals, exchange gifts, particularly giving money to children, and partake in various festive traditions.
- This occasion serves as a moment to acknowledge and express gratitude for the blessings bestowed upon Muslims.

This year, Eid al-Fitr falls on the Evening of Saturday, March 29 to Tuesday, Apr 1, 2025.
