National Indigenous History Month 2024

In 2009, June was declared National Aboriginal History Month by the House of Commons. In 2017, the name was changed to National Indigenous History Month.

National Indigenous History Month is a time for all Canadians, Indigenous, non-Indigenous and newcomers alike, to reflect and educate ourselves on the strength, history, sacrifices, cultures, and contributions of the First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people.

It is important to remember that the histories of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples are distinct, with unique histories within each group.

Why do non-Indigenous Canadians need to learn about Indigenous history?

- Until recently, many Canadians were unaware of the history between Indigenous Peoples and Canada.
- For many generations, Canadians have lived without ever learning about residential schools, the historical and current effects of the Indian Act, the importance of Irretted:Indian Act, the importance of Irretted:Irrett
- Non-Indigenous Canadians should learn about Indigenous history to recognize the significant role of Indigenous Peoples in shaping the <u>country</u> and protecting democracy.
- June is a chance for all Canadians to get together and learn and celebrate Indigenous history.
